

WHAT YOU CAN AND CAN'T DO WITHIN AN EASEMENT

Santos will work with landholders to understand their current and reasonably foreseeable future land uses to ensure the pipeline design, where possible, can accommodate land use requirements.



WHAT YOU CAN DO

Low shrubs and vegetation can be grown over the pipeline.

Normal vehicles and road registerable machinery can be driven over the pipeline easement. Heavy vehicle crossings can be constructed on land where identified.

Fencing is allowed following consultation with Santos.

The easement does not need to be fenced or gated (except where it crosses the boundary between properties).

Crops which can typically be grown within the easement include:

- Annual cropping like wheat, barley, cotton, oats
- Legumes like soybeans, chickpeas, lentils
- Perennials with soft roots like lucerne, alfalfa, asparagus
- Fodder grasses like ryegrass, Rhodes grass
- Vegetables like carrots, onions, tomatoes
- Tubers like potatoes and peanuts.

New tracks or roads can be constructed in consultation with Santos.



WHAT YOU CAN'T DO

While not common on the pipeline route, some woody, perennial crops that live for multiple years and develop woody stems, branches, or trunks can compromise pipelines due to their strength and cannot be planted over the pipeline. This includes:

- Nut and fruit trees
- Oil producing trees.

Excavation, earthworks, and drilling will be restricted.

Construction of buildings including sheds, dwellings, stables and outbuildings will be restricted.
